- ✓ Meeting like-minded friends and mentors




Why UniSC?

Your child's journey to university

Explore a range of opportunities and events at UniSC available for Year 10 through to Year 12 students.

YEAR 10 ©

Experience UniSC

An exclusive day on campus for Year 10 students to explore a range of career paths, speak with academics and current UniSC students and experience what uni life is like. Students will learn more about the field they're interested in or discover something they hadn't previously considered.

Headstart Information Evening

You and your child can attend an information evening to learn all about UniSC's Headstart program, which enables Year 10 (Semester 2), Year 11 and Year 12 students to study a university subject while still in school. These events are held in March and September each year.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

- ✓ Start the conversations about possible careers with your child. Ask them what subjects they like most, what they're good at and what they are interested in outside of school. This will help narrow down the types of jobs or environment they're looking for and school subjects or courses that will assist them on their career pathway.
- Year 10 Senior Education and Training (SET) planning is a crucial process in your child's educational and career pathways journey. It involves you, your child and the school working together to develop a plan for achieving success throughout Years 11, 12 and beyond.
- During SET planning it is important to consider:
 - QCE (Queensland Certificate of Education) requirements
 - ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank) eligibility
 - Tertiary course subject prerequisites
 - Alternate tertiary admissions pathways
 - Vocational Education and Training (VET) and employment options both during school and beyond.
- SET plans should be regularly reviewed and allow for flexibility and adaptation in consultation with all parties if circumstances change (eg illness, academic or other challenges).
 Talk to staff at your child's Year 10 Senior Education and Training (SET) planning events about subject options and career pathways.

YEAR 11



Headstart

Year 10 (Semester 2), Year 11 and Year 12 students can study UniSC subjects while in high school. Your child can get a taste of university life and prepare for future study while gaining points toward their QCE and credit towards a UniSC degree. By successfully participating in two or more Headstart subjects, they are eligible for a tertiary rank giving them admission into a wide variety of UniSC degrees and courses.

Open Day

Open Day is a great opportunity for your child to come on to campus to explore the facilities, attend information sessions and speak one-on-one with academics.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

- Year II is the time for your child to think more seriously about what path they'd like to take after school. Ask them to think about their ideal job which will help them identify their dream degree.
- Attend career expos with your child so they can become more familiar with universities and the degrees on offer.
- Attend information events to get a feel for the campus and ask questions about the degrees your child is interested in studying.
- Talk to as many people as possible and ask lots of questions. Your child can ask professionals what it's like to be a nurse, teacher or accountant, so they hear first-hand what their future career might be like.
- Encourage your child to create a shortlist of degrees that spark their interest and support them to research key information, including entry requirements and what content is covered in the course. This information is available on program pages on the UniSC website.

YEAR 12

Open Day

Even if you attended Open Day in Year 10 or 11, it's important for your child to go along in their final year of high school in case their study interests or circumstances have changed, or they may have different questions to ask academics and staff. usc.edu.au/open-day

Apply to UniSC

Once your child has chosen their degree, they will then need to apply online through the Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC). Make sure they have checked the entry requirements for the degrees they are considering. If your child's application is successful, they'll be notified via email with their offer.

Access UniSC

Your child could be eligible to receive ATAR or selection rank adjustments from QTAC through the Access UniSC scheme, allowing them to boost their rank and increase their study options.

Early Offer Guarantee

Your child can beat the stress of getting into uni by applying for UniSC's Early Offer Guarantee (EOG) Program. They could receive an early and guaranteed offer to UniSC, before the release of Year 12 results. EOG offers are based on the recommendation of their school principal.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

- ✓ Check the Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC) for key dates and information about the application process.
- Ensure your child has checked the entry requirements and required study for any degrees they are considering. If they need to gain prerequisites to study their chosen degree, they can always complete the Tertiary Preparation Pathway (TPP) before commencing university. You can read more about TPP on the next page.
- ✓ Support your child to submit their list of up to six preferences for QTAC. These should be in order of the degree or program that your child would most like to study. Consider keeping your last two preferences for pathway and 'foot in the door' options.

FIRST YEAR AT UNI

Orientation

Orientation provides your child with essential information about their program as well as opportunities to chat with academics and support staff and meet new students.

Student clubs or societies

Student associations are based on common interests like sport, human rights, environmental causes and more. Many degrees or study areas also have student associations available to join.

Academic support

A range of free academic skills workshops are available to help your child develop skills and strategies to enhance their learning.

Through TPP, I learnt really important skills like how to write scientific essays and use Harvard referencing style. I found TPP to be a really nice way to settle into the uni."

Pathways to UniSC

There's more than one way to get into uni.

No matter what your child's situation is, if they're keen to get started at uni, we can help them find a way.

In addition to UniSC's Headstart program for Year 10-12 students and the Early Offer Guarantee, UniSC offers a variety of avenues to help your child get into university.

Tertiary Preparation Pathway (TPP)

TPP equips students with the skills and knowledge needed to succeed at uni and provides a pathway into a degree program. Students can also study TPP to meet prerequisites for their chosen degree.

Pathway diplomas

A pathway diploma is a stand-alone qualification that gives students direct entry and up to one year's credit into selected bachelor degrees. These one-year programs mean students can get a taste for university and have something to show for it, without the commitment of a full degree program.

TAFE/vocational studies

TAFE and vocational studies can also provide an entry pathway to UniSC. Students are assigned a selection rank if they have completed a Certificate III or Certificate IV or if they have completed at least one semester of a Diploma or Advanced Diploma. In some cases, your child may be eligible for credit for prior learning.

Indigenous Direct Entry and Access Scheme (IDEAS)

If you identify as an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander person, you may be given direct entry to a program based on your potential to succeed through our Indigenous Direct Entry Scheme (IDEAS). This is a direct entry scheme for people who may not have completed Year 12 or have no previous study experience. High-school leavers completing year 12 are not eligible and must apply through QTAC.





What is the ATAR?

The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank is the primary mechanism used nationally for tertiary admissions. The ATAR is a percentile rank, not a mark, indicating a student's position relative to other students in any given year.

What is a minimum selection threshold?

Eligibility for a degree requires meeting or exceeding the ATAR or selection rank, known as the minimum selection threshold. These thresholds can vary each year based on available spots, number of applicants, and their academic performance. You can find the threshold for each program in the QTAC and UniSC study guide for an idea of what you need to secure a place at UniSC.

What is the difference between subject prerequisites and recommended prior study?

Subject prerequisites are subjects studied in Year 11 and 12 that are considered necessary for applicants to complete in order to gain entry into an undergraduate degree (program). Subject prerequisites must be met before you can be made an offer to study at UniSC.

Recommended prior study is the knowledge students should have in a subject area. Completing recommended subjects is helpful but not compulsory to be made an offer.

What is the difference between a semester, session and trimester?

Semester 1 and 2 are the main teaching periods for degrees studied at an undergraduate level.

Trimester 1, 2 and 3 consist of 12 teaching weeks, a study break, and an exam period. Courses available in trimester-based study periods are usually studied at a postgraduate level.

Sessions consist of 8 intensive teaching weeks, a study break and exam period.

What are the different types of study modes available?

Full-time study is usually 3-4 courses per semester.

Part-time study can be a great option if students have other commitments that take up much of their time, as they can still make progress towards a degree (usually 1-2 courses per semester) at a pace that suits their needs

An online degree can be a great option for students who need flexibility. Students will complete self-directed online learning materials (podcasts, interviews, simulations, screencasts, recorded discussions and quizzes) at their own pace, at whatever time suits them best. They will still have full access to the facilities and services offered across all UniSC campuses.

Blended learning means students learn through a combination of in-person seminars and face-to-face tutorials, workshops or lab classes (usually on campus) supported by online learning materials which are completed at their own pace, at a time that suits them best.

What is Work-Integrated Learning?

At UniSC, we prefer practical training to relying solely on traditional lectures. Our goal is for students to be ready for the workforce, prepared to step into their chosen career field after graduation — and nothing beats applied experience when it comes to learning.

We call these work experience opportunities 'Work-Integrated Learning' (WIL), where students put classroom theory into practice.

At UniSC, students complete WIL as a part of almost every degree we offer. It can be in the form of an internship, practicum, placement, industry project or field experience where students can develop their skills, establish professional networks, and discover what it's like to work in their area of study.

What does it cost to go to uni?

We understand the cost of study can be a significant barrier in many students' decision to go to university, but it doesn't need to be.

Between course fees, textbooks and living expenses, there are a number of costs to consider when your child starts university.

Being prepared for these expenses and knowing what help is available will ensure you aren't caught off-guard so your child can plan ahead and manage their money.

Study fees and expenses

Course fees depend on the type and length of a degree. On average, a student studying full-time can expect to pay between \$4,124-\$15,142* per year.

There's also a Student Services and Amenities Fee, which is used for improving student services and facilities. This amount is around \$300 and is indexed annually by the Federal Government.

Students may also be required to purchase items such as textbooks, equipment or uniforms to help them with their studies, so it's good to factor some extra money in the budget to cover these costs.

Other costs to consider

There will also be expenses such as printing costs, parking or public transport and some degree programs (eg education, health) may require memberships, certifications, licences and/or immunisations.

Household expenses

If your child is planning to move away from home for study, they will need to budget for these additional costs, such as rent, utility bills, bond and moving costs and of course food and groceries.

There are a variety of accommodation options close to UniSC's campuses, including student villages, share houses or private rentals.

Financial support

Whilst there are several costs involved with going to uni, it's important to remember that there is help available.

If your child is an Australian citizen, holds a permanent humanitarian visa or is a New Zealand citizen who holds a Special Category Visa (SCV) and meets eligibility requirements, they are eligible to borrow money through the Commonwealth HELP loan scheme. This means that the payment of fees can be deferred until your child is earning above the threshold.


Your child may also be eligible for government assistance, such as Youth Allowance, Austudy, ABSTUDY, rent assistance or a student start-up loan. Visit humanservices.gov.au and search 'payments for students and trainees' for more information.
